Unsung Heroes: The Music of Jazz in New Haven Film Screening & Conversation

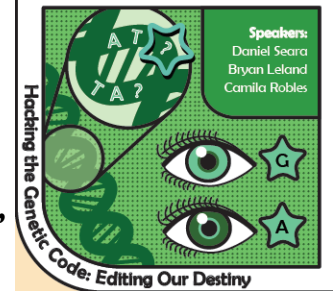

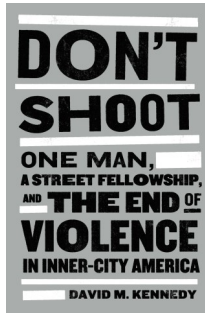

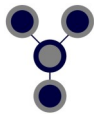

Running time: 82 minutes | Pulaar with English subtitles

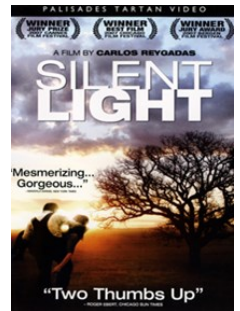
