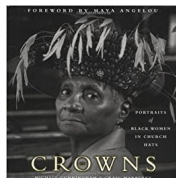

Pysanky Workshop

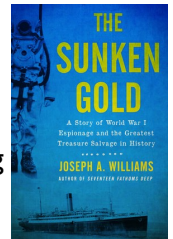
