



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INTRODUCTION AND PROCESS

Building Bridges to Knowledge, Community, and Opportunity 2025-2028 New Haven Free Public Library Strategic Framework

In our last Strategic Plan, the **New Haven Free Public Library (NHFPL)** embarked on a comprehensive planning journey to build on its achievements and strengthen its connection with the city it serves. The result was *Growing Together: One City, One Future*, a five-year plan that redefined the Library's purpose. Once viewed primarily as an educational institution, NHFPL embraced our broader identity as a trusted and vital community hub.

As the world continues to change, so too do the roles and responsibilities of libraries, which have **evolved beyond their traditional role as repositories of books and information** to form deeper, more active partnerships with their communities. To meet these needs, the Library must be a place where learning and connection converge to support residents through expanded access to workforce development, community well-being, and social services resources to support the aspirations of all New Haven residents.

Recognizing this important shift, NHFPL's leadership team and the 2025-2028 Strategic Plan Steering Committee launched a new planning process that **reflects agility, inclusivity, and thoughtful reflection on community feedback** to develop responsive priorities for the Library's future. Drawing upon surveys and focus groups as well as Census data, Data Haven reports, and ongoing interactions between staff and patrons, NHFPL gathered insights from more than a thousand voices to shape its next chapter.

STAFF PLANNING SESSIONS

Library staff played a central role in shaping our new strategic framework. During a series of staff planning sessions held in the summer and fall of 2024, the systemwide library team gathered together to share their insights, experiences, and hopes for both the Library's and the community's future. These sessions built upon years of collaboration and on-the-ground experience serving New Haven's neighborhoods, capturing the everyday realities of library work and the deep community relationships that define it.

The discussions centered on themes of connection, equity, innovation, and belonging. Participants reflected on how library services could continue to evolve to meet changing community needs. **Our staff emphasized the importance of:**

- Ensuring that **every visitor feels welcome and represented** in our spaces and programs.
- Strengthening **internal communication** and **systemwide collaboration**.
- **Expanding outreach** that connects with New Haveners where they live, learn, and gather.
- Continuing to invest in **professional growth, technology, and creative capacity** to sustain innovation across all locations.

This input informed every level of the strategic planning process, helping to ensure that the goals of this plan are grounded in both community voice and staff expertise.

COMMUNITY FEEDBACK

The Library conducted a multilingual digital and print survey to gather comprehensive community feedback on how residents engage with and value its services, spaces, and staff. The survey assessed patterns of library use, levels of satisfaction, and perceived barriers, while inviting participants to prioritize service areas such as a **broad range of literacies including reading, digital and health literacy, workforce development, cultural enrichment, and community connection**. Collected in five languages including English, Spanish, Chinese, Dari and Pashto, the survey responses were accompanied by optional demographic data, providing critical insights to guide equity-focused planning and decision-making.

NHFPL hosted thirteen Community Engagement Sessions across New Haven to gather deeper feedback from residents. Held at all five library locations and online, these sessions were conducted in English, Spanish, and Chinese to ensure accessibility and inclusion. Guided by a structured discussion framework, participants shared aspirations, identified neighborhood priorities, and reflected on how the Library can build on its strengths to meet emerging opportunities in technology, education, culture, and civic life. The insights from these conversations grounded the planning process in authentic community voices and a **shared vision for a more connected, creative, and equitable city**.

In addition to community listening sessions and surveys, we also solicited feedback far beyond the Library's walls. Throughout the summer and fall of 2024, NHFPL staff both administered surveys and gathered informal data at outdoor festivals, neighborhood events, and mobile outreach visits across the City. The recurring themes of **access, representation, and connection** reinforced the Library's ongoing commitment to inclusivity and responsiveness. These values remain at the heart of the 2025-2028 Strategic Framework.

Through these combined methods, the Library developed a comprehensive understanding of its impact, shaping the direction of **Building Bridges to Knowledge, Community, and Opportunity**.




COMMUNITY PARTICIPANTS

Data was collected through **thirteen** community engagement feedback sessions and **five** partner organization discussions, as well as a **youth services survey** and a 22-question **anonymous community survey** offered both online and on paper in **five languages** from September 2024 to December 2024. Participants were also invited to provide optional demographic information.


Ages




Highest Education Degree




Household Makeup



Housing Status




Employment Status




Importance of Services

Twenty-first century libraries have evolved from a place to borrow books into a vibrant nexus of civic engagement, where neighbors meet, share ideas and talents, strengthen community, and access resources for education and enjoyment. NHFPL is no exception. **Each library location strives to be a welcoming, dynamic gathering place** where residents come together for civic engagement, shared learning, and discovery of local resources.

This framework enhances the Library's role as New Haven's connective tissue. We serve as a trusted guide; connecting residents to a wealth of resources and ensuring that information remains accessible to everyone in our community. Building on this commitment, the Library will cultivate stronger **partnerships with local organizations**, host more **community forums**, and create meaningful **opportunities for resource sharing**. Across locations, NHFPL will expand **access to citizenship and naturalization resources**, increase **opportunities for civic engagement with elected officials**, and explore new ways to promote our own programs so residents better understand the services available to them.

Community well-being flourishes and the cultural life of the city deepens when residents have access to reliable information and opportunities to participate. The Library, already a trusted and essential hub, seeks to build on this foundation through expanded resources and a more intentional, organized approach to sharing information. NHFPL connects New Haveners to knowledge, services, and one another, making learning and engagement part of everyday life.

STRATEGIC INITIATIVE 2

Catalyst for Career Pathways and Upward Mobility

As a cornerstone of lifelong learning and community advancement, the **New Haven Free Public Library drives career mobility and economic opportunity**, equipping residents with the tools, knowledge, and confidence to pursue upward pathways. Our wide range of programs and resources support adults seeking career growth, teens preparing to enter the workforce, and library users looking to strengthen their financial stability and digital proficiency through expanded learning opportunities.

Library users have access to a wealth of free in-person and online-based resources that help them pursue personal and professional growth. In the new framework, we position the Library as a place where individuals develop the confidence and competencies needed to succeed in an increasingly digital world through a comprehensive suite of **digital literacy programs, library-led workshops, and one-on-one support**.

A commitment to financial and self-sufficiency underpins this work. Residents can access workshops and resources that **demystify budgeting, debt management, and retirement planning**, laying the groundwork for **long-term financial health and stability**. Aspiring business owners can **connect with local entrepreneurs** to share best practices and make their dreams a reality.

As a community, we recognize the importance of supporting teens and young adults as they move into the next stage of their education and careers. New Haven Public Schools plays a vital role in providing these resources, and our programming is curated to complement and strengthen that support. Our **school-to-career transition programming** helps New Haven youth build their first resume, develop

interview skills, navigate university and FAFSA applications, and **explore college and training opportunities**.

By working together, we help create a network of support that ensure students have access to the guidance and information they need to take confident steps into the future.

STRATEGIC INITIATIVE 3

Libraries as essential learning spaces for Education, Exploration, and Enrichment for all

The Library continues to reaffirm its core commitment to **literacy in all its forms** and to meaningful enrichment, while thoughtfully expanding educational resources through new and innovative approaches. Serving at the epicenter of community enrichment and connection, our culturally inclusive spaces encourage curiosity and discovery across all ages.

Student **tutoring** and homework help, expanded **Stay and Play** sessions, and **life skills classes** for teens are just a few of the ways we provide vital foundational tools for academic success. For adults and families, **English language learning**, **digital inclusion**, and **workforce readiness** initiatives open doors to opportunity and personal growth.

Preserving and sharing New Haven's rich historical legacy and the diverse range of stories that have shaped it are equally important to the Library's mission. NHFPL aims to capture these impactful voices and experiences through program offerings and **reimagined access to local history resources**. By making historical records easier to navigate, residents are encouraged to discover their heritage, celebrate their community's stories, and build a deeper understanding of our neighbors and our past. An **expanded Memory Lab** will further support this work with new tools and guided programming for residents to **preserve personal records, photographs, and oral histories**, capturing these important memories for posterity. This expansion aligns with the City of New Haven's **Cultural Equity Plan** and the shared goal of honoring the history of our neighbors and telling the collective story of New Haven for future generations.



Incubator for Culture, Curiosity, and Creativity in a Diverse and Vibrant Community


Art and imagination are essential to a strong and inspired city where cultural expression fuels connection and community. This spirit is reflected in **New Haven's recent national recognition** – and growing spotlight for its vibrant art scene. Building on this momentum, NHFPL contributes to the local arts ecosystem by offering **creative workshops, exhibition space, and opportunities for collaboration** with a wide range of arts and cultural organizations throughout the city.

As a place where literature and creativity organically intersect, **the Library curates meaningful opportunities to bring art to life** and

serves as a third space that connects artists and audiences. Flexible learning environments serve as launchpads for innovation by **showcasing local artists, hosting makers and storytellers**, and cultivating opportunities to build community, connection, and belonging among those who create.
